Lathe goes to Waratah Mayfield Men's Shed



Staff have donated \$25,000 from their pay since a Workplace Giving program was established in 2017. Koppers has matched the staff donations taking the total contribution to date to \$50,000. It will continue to match all staff donations.



Adam donates to the service because it does an amazing job rescuing injured people or quickly getting them to an emergency department for treatment.

"Hopefully it is not the case, but you never know if you or someone you know will need help from the Westpac Rescue Helicopter," Adam said.
